An introduction to the EU's new articles

The aim of the chapter is to create a transatlantic customs environment that makes it easier to export and import goods.

The new articles would:

- establish a work plan for cooperating with US customs to integrate and harmonise key customs procedures
- define the objectives of the Customs and Trade Facilitation chapter
- set up a committee to oversee the implementation of the chapter
- encourage the development of trusted trader programmes for compliant companies, including SMEs.

The chapter would include a set of rules, and in addition we propose that EU and US customs work together on some key issues to facilitate transatlantic trade.

Such work would include:

- Harmonising the data that EU and US customs collect
- Cooperating on so-called Single Windows – these offer one place online where an exporting or importing firm can provide information to allow customs and the relevant regulatory agencies to check its goods.
- Jointly setting up so-called Authorized Operator or Trusted Trader schemes

These simplify customs procedures for companies with a track record of complying with customs procedures in the past.

 Recognising each other's advance rulings –a ruling means that customs give certain useful information to an exporter or importer before they export or import their goods.

The information can be about:

- the classification of the goods how they are categorized for customs purposes
- the origin of the goods whether they qualify as coming from the EU or the US and hence benefit from lower customs duties.
- Coordinating better on international standards.

A set of objectives in the chapter would put the obligations in context and help both the EU and US to interpret it.

In addition, a committee of EU and US customs experts would oversee implementation of the chapter.
